Curriculum

Emergent Play

Play is not only fun but it is a child's job. It is the best way in which children learn about their world. At Midtown Lutheran Preschool we don't just play all day but create curriculum out of the play of our students. When children play, instructors are able to observe and assess interests and development of the students which drives what happens in the classroom. This is called Emergent Curriculum and is play-based while being very intentional.

Projects

Projects are an expression of the Emergent Curriculum but are a focused study based on the interests of the students in the class. The project component will be more evident in the older classrooms but there is much opportunity for smaller projects in younger years too. More research is showing that project-based curriculums promote more problem solving and critical thinking skills in students which are 21st century skills that adults will need. German

Below are some of the everyday vocabulary and phrases that the children hear from Geneva – perhaps you are starting to hear some too! German Halloween/Fall vocabulary to come soon!

Hände waschen – washing hands

Käse - cheese

Wasser - water

Guten Morgen – Good Morning

Tschüss – Good-bye (informal)

fertig – done

guck mal – look at this (informal to someone familiar)

Mittagessen – lunch

Buch - book

hinsetzen – sit down

I have no background in the German language so Geneva has been fielding many questions from me. Two interesting grammatical pieces that I've learned are that all nouns are capitalized, and that any two nouns that describe one thing are put together into a compound word. Now that you know this too, take a look around at our environmental print in the room and see what you notice!
